A JOURNEY THROUGH THREE THEMATICS

1) WHAT EDUCATIONAL MODEL FOR THE FUTURE GENERATION OF ARCHITECTS AND URBAN PLANNERS?

which cities constantly growing and facing increasing challenges, African cities must reinvent themselves to ensure a more sustainable urban future. Achieving development goals and making cities levers of growth for the continent requires considerable resources, including human resources. Indeed, human resources and more specifically locally trained quality architects, planners and urban engineers are an indispensable part of building the African city of tomorrow. But do the training opportunities on the continent meet the needs quantitatively and qualitatively? How to adapt the curricula to take advantage of the opportunities offered by African cities? Which architects and urban planners do we want for the city of tomorrow? And how to train them?

The objective of this theme is to draw up an inventory of training in architecture and urban planning on the continent, and to try to design an appropriate model for training in urban professions on the continent.

2) HOW CULTURE COULD INFLUENCE THE MAKING OF THE CITIES ON THE CONTINENT?

frica is characterized by its great cultural wealth. This culture has long been the basis of the urban fabric through the civilizations and empires that have ruled the continent. The living traces of these civilizations are still visible through the architectural and urban remains as in Mali with the mosque of Djenne, the cities of Timbuktu and Gao, the Great Zimbabwe, etc. The medinas of North Africa, or the traditional chiefdoms of West Cameroon are good examples of conservation and development of this rich heritage.

In addition, the urban development models in Africa are for the most part not adapted to local cultures. In fact, African cities are more in line with standardized and westernized models of city building. So, in view of the limits and inadequacies that the classic methods of city building show, would relying on African cultures to build the city of tomorrow not be the appropriate path to follow, for more sustainable cities? How to draw from this African culture and learn from the African architectural and urban heritage to build the city of tomorrow?

These are the questions that this theme will try to answer.

3)WHAT IS THE PLACE OF INNOVATION IN THE FUTURE OF OUR CITIES?

nnovation lies above all in the way things are approached. In the context of African cities, the innovative approach to urban planning includes digital tools but not only. It includes both digitally inspired innovation and non-technological innovation linked to new ideas, approaches and partnerships. It is a process, including actions and outcomes that create and deliver new knowledge, tools and sustainable solutions to improve the living conditions of all in human settlements.

The aim of this theme is to show how innovative approaches can build more sustainable cities in Africa. These approaches include creative industries, digital technologies, citizen participation, climate action, etc.
